# ARMISTICE DAY.

The G.O.C. 3rd Division, Major-General Sir W. C. G. Heneker, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., inspected the battalion on Dec. 6th, and Colonel Sir Hugh Elles, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., commanding the IXth Infantry Brigade, visited the battalion on January 3rd to see training in progress.

## PAARDEBURG DAY.

. From the Portsmouth " Evening News."

The 1st Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment is justly proud of the great victory of Paardeburg during the Boer War, and every year a Ball in commemoration is held on this important day. The Battalion, which arrived at Gosport several months ago after a long period of foreign service, held the usual celebration in the Gymnasium at the New Barracks, on Wednesday evening, the 300 guests, including the Commanding Officer, (Lt. Col. C. J. Pickering, C.M.G., D.S.O.) and the principal officers of the battalion, the members of the Sergeants' Mess and their friends, guests from the Royal Marines (Eastney) and other units at Portsmouth. The Mayor of Gosport (Alderman J. F. Lee, J.P.) was unable to accept the invitation, but Councillor A. Hopper was present representing the Town Council.

The members of the Sergeants' Mess, of which Regimental-Sergt.-Major T. Milner, and Sergt. D. Gould (President) are the leading figures, were responsible for the entire arrangements, and they are to be congratulated on the success attending the effort. The spacious Gymnasium was effectively decorated with flags and streamers, and at one end there was a imposing display of cups and shields won by the Battalion, together with drums, colours, and the crest, the whole being guarded by two soldiers in their scarlet uniforms.

The Battalion Band, under the direction of Bandmaster E. Ovington, supplied the music, and dancing was continued from 8 p.m. until 2 a.m., the programme comprising 20 dances and four extras.

# BAND.

The band and drums have been supplied with the pre-war full dress uniform and recently made their first public appearance at a Concert in the Thorngate Hall, Gosport.

The following is an extract from the description of the Concert in the Portsmouth "Evening News."—

Instrumental concerts are quite a change from the usual type of entertainment given at Gosport, and that held the Thorngate Hall on Tuesday evening, under the auspices of the Gosport Boy Scouts' Association, in aid of its funds, was particularly welcome, as it marked the first public appearance in the Town of the Band of the 1st Battalion Duke of Wellington's Regiment, stationed at the New Barracks. The Band is a fine one, the performance was greatly enjoyed, and strengthened the cordial social feeling which exists between the battalion and Gosport folk.

The capital programme was under the direction of Bandmaster E. Ovington, and encores were frequent.

The band fulfilled another important engagement on Sunday, March 16th, when they gave Concerts on the South Parade Pier, Southsea, in the afternoon and evening.

# PERSONAL.

Major R. M. Tidmarsh retired on March 6th, 1924 with the rank of Lieut.-Colonel.

Lieut.-Colonel R. K. Healing, on completion of his period of service in command, has been placed on the half-pay list. He was gazetted a Second Lieutenant in the West India Regiment in 1894, and transferred to the West Riding Regiment in 1901 as a Captain, and reached the substantive rank of Lieut-Colonel in 1920. During the war he was successively D.A.Q.M.G., 61st Division, Central Force, Home Defence; D.A.A. and Q.M.G., and later A.Q.M.G. Aldershot Command. He served in the South African War in 1902.

Lieut.-Colonel N. G. Burnard, D.S.O., who has been promoted to that rank to command the 1st Battalion the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, formerly belonged to the Leinster Regiment. During the war he was Adjutant of a Special Reserve Battalion, and later commanded the 10th Battalion Royal Irish Rifles, winning the D.S.O. His previous active service was in South Africa in 1902, when he was wounded.

Capt. V. C. Green sailed for Egypt to join the 2nd Battalion on February 18th.

# SPORTS.

# RUGBY FOOTBALL.

Rugger was started at the end of October, as soon as we had got settled into barracks.

There were several difficulties to be overcome at the outset. Nearly the whole battalion went on two months leave; leaving us few to pick a side from, and of those few we knew nothing about their qualities as players, and had to try many people before we finally picked a team af any sort.

Our first match was on October 31st., since then we have had two matches per week. In December we commenced to run a 2nd XV., which has had a dozen matches. Our first match was won on December 1st and since then the team has had quite a successful season.

We entered for the Army Rugger Cup, and drew a bye in the first round. In the second round we met the 1st. Depot Battalion Royal Tank Corps on their own ground. This match was played on December 19th, and we won 9-0. The forwards played well and were superior all round to their opponents, but playing up the slope and against a heavy wind the team did well to stop The Tanks from scoring. 2nd/Lt. Exham was carried off the field ten minutes before half-time. We were pressing the whole of the second half and would have scored more, but for the ineffectiveness of our scrum half. Lt. Haslock opened the scoring with a try far out; C.Q.M.S. Wootton missed the kick. mersall scored next, Wootton again failing to convert. Goodwin made the final score; 2nd. Lt. Faithfull hitting the upright with the kick. Of the forwards C.S.M. Brown, Pte. Griffiths and Foy were good. Lt. Haslock was the best of the outsides, who all showed improved form.

In the 3rd round we met the South Wales Borderers on their own ground and lost 19—0. They were the better team, but won owing to their backs, who handled a wet and greasy ball well. The first half was a forward battle, in which they scored once from a loose rush. We obtained the ball in nearly every scrum, but our outsides could do nothing with it. In the second half they scored four times; they got the ball in nearly every scrum, Brown, our hooker, having left the field at half-time with a dislocated shoulder. Our forwards kept at it, but our backs

could not cope with theirs. C.Q.M.S. Wootton played a sound game at back, always being on the ground with a man when they scored. Foy and C.S.M. Brown were the best of the forwards who all worked hard.

In November it was decided to award caps, on the principle that they would be the exception rather than the rule. Mr. Faithfull was awarded his as captain, and C.S.M. Brown was given his after the second round Army Cup, C.Q.M.S. Wootton after the 3rd round and Pte. Griffiths on March 15th.

Company Leagues were started at the end of February, but are not yet finished.

Our prospects for next season are fairly good. Our team with three exceptions is young, and we should therefore keep the same team for several years. At present they lack a good deal in knowledge of the game and experience, but that will come with practice. Company Leagues will be played next season and we should find new talent there. We have 2nd/Lt. Browne, who has just joined us, an Army player to coach the backs and 2nd/Lt. Faithfull, also an Army player to teach the forwards.

ARMY CUP. (THIRD ROUND.)

The Duke of Wellington's Regiment team from Gosport failed to qualify for the fourth round of the Army Rugby Cup, being beaten at Plymouth by the South Wales Borderers. The Gosport side lost by two goals and three tries to nil, but the game was by no means as one-sided as this would lead one to believe. The Wellington's were beaten outside the scrum, but at forward there was a pretty even struggle, and Faithfull, the Wellington's scrum-winger, intensely pleased the critics.

# ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL.

A strenuous and successful "soccer" season is now drawing to a close. Fixtures were arranged before the battalion's return from Constantinople and the Details at Gosport did their best to "hold the fort" until the return of the regimental team. The battalion entered for the Portsmouth United Service League, Divisions I, II, IV (boys), and for the Army Cup, Portsmouth Senior Cup and Gosport Hospital Charity Cup.

In the U.S. League Div. I., several reverses were met with until it was possible to field the full regimental team which commenced with a 6—1 victory over the R.A.F. Gosport. Since then the team have worked their way up in the League table from the bottom position to about half-way. The second team were more successful early in the season and are in a good position in the league table.

The battalion received a bye in the first round of the Army Cup; beat the Tank Corps in the second round, but were knocked out in the third round by the Depot Royal Tank Corps in an excellent game played at Portsmouth.

The following caps have been awarded for the season 1923—24, Cpl. Thorpe, L/Cpl. Ward, Ptes. Myatt and Earl.

The Tank Corps were now on the defensive, and after Thorpe, Jackson and Earle had combined well together, Dixon broke up the movement when Thorpe looked like going through. Thorpe missed an open goal, but somewhat made up for this a minute later by testing Jolly with a very hot shot, the goalie having to dive to clear. The first half had been in favour of the Wellington's, and if their shooting had been up to the mark, they would have had a good lead.
