

Foreword by Lt Col DS Bruce MBE Commanding Officer 1DWR

On taking command of the 1st Battalion I spoke about our need to be prepared for the unexpected and how we must learn to manage uncertainty. Nothing could have been more unexpected than the phone call from the Brigade Commander on 11 Mar 03 informing me that the Battalion were to deploy to Kuwait and that we were to be there by the end of the week! Similarly nothing could have been more uncertain than the 4 months that followed! The deployment is now history and accounts in this War Diary along with the photos tell the story of our War. It is designed to be light hearted and informative and to serve as a reminder of some of the incredible experiences we faced during Operation TELIC.

I am enormously proud to have commanded The Duke's on such an operation and can reflect on the incredible character, professionalism, guts and determination demonstrated by our Officers, NCOs and soldiers. You were to a man, quite simply magnificent and set a standard that few could match; your humour was infectious and the uncomplaining manner that you approached the uncertainty and difficulties of the deployment was extraordinary. You can be justifiably proud of all that you achieved in such a harsh and testing environment. The experience will remain with you throughout your careers and the Battalion will benefit from hardened, mature and professional soldiers who will be our Junior and Senior NCOs of the future.

We must also thank our families in Cheshire and Yorkshire as well as the wider 'Regimental Family' for the tremendous support they gave us throughout the tour. The welcome home was a particularly moving experience and we can reflect now on our tremendous good fortune that every man and woman returned home safely.

The Deployment

MISSION STATEMENT

"1 DWR will deploy on Op TELIC as part of the Prisoner Of War Handling Organisation...to comprise of BG HQ and 3 x Rifle Cos... BG to be in theatre within 1 week..."

"By failing to prepare you are preparing to fail"
(Abraham Lincoln). Not so in the case of the Dukes... Unexpectedly on 11 Mar 03 the CO announced that 1DWR would deploy on Op TELIC. There would be no time to prepare!

18 hrs later the R Gp were in Kuwait with the lads close behind. The definition of a 'Fast Ball'? Camp Rhino in Kuwait would host the Bn whilst they got to grips with the task, the admin and the weather. Undoubtedly the continual threat of NBC attack coupled with very regular practices directed the minds and attentions of all ranks to the forthcoming Operation.

Quite how to rehearse establishing a PW Camp posed a problem. However it would fall to the older and bolder ranks to demonstrate the forgotten art of erecting 18' x 24' tents. Not very 'Boys Own Starks' but very useful stuff indeed.

In what had been a whirlwind of unexpected activity, the Dukes soldier now found himself facing the real prospect of going to war. 21 Mar 03, the Bn moved to Holding Area Waterloo and then early on 22 Mar 03, Corunna Coy led the Dukes over the border into Iraq and the unknown.

"1 DWR is to provide security for the PWMO site, assist in the construction of the PWMO echelon and via the DCP JOT ensure that the PWMO can recover the burden of PW's from 1st Rgt as soon as possible."

Deploying to war on a Bedford - well it's far from ideal - but the Dukes did it. Once across the border they swung towards Umm Qasr to begin taking on their role as the Prisoner of War Handling Organisation (PWMO). This ran from 22-25 Mar '03, receiving some 938 prisoners on the 23rd alone! Initially Alma Coy formed the Inner Cordon with Burma & Corunna constituting the Outer Cordon. Later Alma & Burma swapped tasks. As rumour began to spread that a move and a new job was on the cards, 12 Bty Royal Artillery began to take hold of the PWMO reins. They adopted a slightly different stance to the Dukes prompting the lads to coin the phrase, "if you want to do a runner, be guarded by a Gunner". On the evening of the 24th BG

Main & Alma Coy received a Warning Order to move forward to conduct protection operations in the Divisional Rear Area from the 25th. And so the next unexpected chapter in this whole experience began...

Winds of Change



OC & CSM Alma ready to create havoc



The winds of change were firmly blowing in the direction of the Dukes. From the 25 Mar 03 elements of the Bn began tasking as 1 (UK) Armoured Div Troops. The night of the 25th is unlikely to be forgotten by many, as a storm of biblical proportions swept through the area of operations testing the resolve and patience of all ranks. However with PWMO now behind them, the Bn could begin to do some "proper" soldiering. At Div the Duke soldier was exposed to the curious creature that is a Staff Officer. Indeed the Staff Officers could not come to terms with the speed that a Duke can dig a high quality trench, clean his rifle, eat his dinner and smoke 20 cigarettes – whilst managing to swear with every third word. By now the Dukes were beginning to establish themselves as a highly flexible, professional and robust unit capable of most things with the minimum of planning and preparation. CNN News obviously caught wind of this, "mentioning" some of the Alma lads in Safwan, or maybe it was the female reporters that let the lads be "ambushed"??

As dramatic events began to unfold around Basra it came as no surprise that a move and probably a new mission would be on the cards. 01 Apr 03 (and an April fool) HQHQ received the Warning Order to begin moving to Al Zubayr (AZ). Thus in the space of a week, the DWR BG had changed from theater troops to Div troops onto 7 Arm'd Bde troops. 03 Apr heralded the end of the beginning – an established 'patch' to begin the tricky and dangerous start to Peace Support Ops. AZ had seen some fierce fighting and resistance from Iraqi units - the atmosphere amongst the narrow and confusing streets of the market town was tense and highly charged. This became very evident as arrest was never very far away especially at water and aid distribution points. As the Bn got immersed in reconstructing the stability of AZ, both under 3 Cdo Bde and the Desert Rats, a gale from the winds of change would establish a dramatically enlarged area of responsibility. From 02 May to 28 Jun 03 DWR would be responsible for 9500 Sq Kilometres of Iraq including the towns of AZ, Safwan, Umm Qasr, southern Iraq's GOSPS and other key oil infrastructure sites. A formidable challenge!





"The Final Chapter". With effect from 02 May 03, IDWR was responsible for 9500 sq kms of Iraq. A staggering progression from the original mission. The primary tasks were searches, "mug" VCOP's, patrolling, anti-smuggling ops, the security of the oil infrastructure, long range desert patrols, point security and supporting the Iraqi police. Khor Az Zubayr Port was home for the majority of the Dukes with Burma situated in AZ and sub units dotted all across the country at key sites. Almas were responsible for Umm Qasr, Safwan, Umm Khayyal and the Petro-Chemical plants in the area. Burma Coy focused their efforts in Az Zubayr & neighbouring settlements. While Curraus's AO included Ar Rumayyah, and other key oil infrastructure sites in the vast western desert. J Rey MRAA (attached) concentrated on Abu Al Khush and the Al Faw peninsula. It was quite a feat to crack on with such a demanding work load under difficult, dangerous and harsh climatic circumstances for not too many needless to have been thrown from the grail. A tremendous amount was achieved, 1550 days gained returning home as bronzed Gods, lessons learnt, lots of growing up done.



The advance from Kuwait was ordered to say the least. It was broken up by two stops where we had to protect ourselves by displaying an NBC screen as well as normal ground tactics. Whilst everyone else, shall we say, for protection against, bedrock fire, I was whilst in one of those shelf scraps being briefed by the Pl Commander, that he thought healthy. Within nine seconds the four soldiers present were wishing they had stopped respirators as the smell was overwhelming. The Pl Commander was sitting like a school girl and forced out another which did the previous one too bad. The smell was worse than a local Kipper market at odd days. As he started to leave, one of the lads pointed out that he was near and a little stuck around the back end. The Pl Commander did the dash test and to his disbelief and amazement he found he had 8cm in pants. More guffawing started and whilst falling 'back' into his shelf scraps on his desire squirming the offaline bags down his legs. Needless to say he was at the front of the queue when the CQMs handed out some toilet paper for a change! b

29 Mar 2003

In the early days of OP TELIC back in Kuwait all the rifle companies were on an NBC lesson. The lesson had been running for about an hour and the instructor was going through all the drills like how to decontaminate etc... He was on the last words of the lesson "well guys to sum it up..." we all issued a whistling sound, everybody looked up to see where it was coming from. By this stage the instructor shouts "GAS, GAS, GAS!" but most people were still looking in the air for the noise. Then BOOM!! About 50m away the whistling thing landed, everyone started panicking trying to get their NBC suits on while still wearing their webbing. One guy just threw everything on the floor and dived into cover. All the commanders were trying to find their sections, but didn't have a person. After about 10 minutes we had all managed to get into hard cover and started to decontaminate. All the way through the day and night we were in and out of NBC kit as we kept getting attacked. That was the scariest time of my life.






CORUNNA'S OP TELIC CALENDAR

12 March 03 - OC, Maj Nigel Goodwin, arrived in theatre with the Battalion Recon Group.

16 March 03 - Corunna Company complete, with the exception of the UKMC party who were delayed in Azerbaijan and UAE. Initial tasking was the provision of security to one half of the PM Holding Area, planned to be constructed some 2 kms West of Umm Qasr.

20 March 03 - Air war started.

21 March 03 - Corunna Company was ordered forward to Holding Area Waterloo at 0700hrs Zulu. The Battalion moved North, led by Corunna Company. Initial orders were for the Company to move to an assembly area South of the Birem and just 8 kms short of the border. After digging in and providing local security, it became apparent that 1st Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), who were clearing Umm Qasr, had taken 280 POWs and needed assistance whilst they continued to clear the town.

Eventually, after 40 minutes notice, Corunna Company led the Battalion up to the assembly area. After 3 hrs of listening to several firefights and the guns of 29 Commando Regiment, orders were given to cross the border. The Company deployed to the eastern perimeter and dug in.

22 March - 4 April 03 - Operations in POW Holding Area.

6 April 03 - Orders were given to return to the Battalion in Az Zubayr. The Area of Operations (AO) consisted of a large rural area, a platoon sized guard task and two urban areas. The platoon task was the security of an oil and gas storage facility and a Gas and Oil Separation Plant (GOSP). Urban patrolling was conducted in a residential area, nicknamed Barnaby.

14 May 03 - Corunna Company inherited a Brigade size Area of Operations that equated to the same size as Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cumbria combined; including the strategically vital Rumaylah Oil Fields and processing plants as well as vital gasfield. Corunna Company deployed a Platoon permanently in the town of Rumaylah to dominate the urban area and provide a G9 focus, whilst also deploying 5 day Long Range Patrols to patrol the 800 square kilometers in depth. Corunna Company has made over 100 arrests and seized over 80 weapons and 25 vehicles. The Company has also trained some 750 Iraqi Oil Security Guards to take over the key point protection of the Oil Infrastructure (handing responsibility for Iraq back to the Iraqis).

27 June 03 - Corunna Company return to Osnabrück.



After we were established and the area was secure we became the first unit to patrol and VCP in berets.
