Over 200 wartime production controls in the U.S.A., have been cancelled, they affect refrigeratoradios, etc.

There will be Resettlement Advice Offices in all towns in which there are Employment Exchanges, i.e. about 370 in all.

In order to meet the needs of applicants living in remote areas from these 370 principle Employment Exchange Centres, the new offices will link up with the 600 or more subsidiary Local Offices of the Department (Employment Offices and Branch Employment Offices, mainly in rural districts) and any enquiry which cannot be dealt with directly by those subsidiary offices will be met either by visiting officers from the present Resettlement Advice Office or by invitation to attend the nearest Resettlement Advice Office. In all, therefore, about 1000 offices will take part in the new service, and so ensure that it is universal throughout the country.

The New Offices will work in close collaboration with local offices of other Government Departments, Local Authorities, ex-servicemen's associations and voluntary organisations of all kinds, and, if an enquirers needs can best be met by reference to these other sources of help and guidance, or require specialised treatment, the necessary contacts

will be made.
