Britain is to obtain from the U.S.A. a at 2% over 50 years. 9/10 of this loan is "new money," to be used for the purchase of supplies and services in the U.S.A. The remainder will be used to pay for Lease-lend materials that were on their way to Britain when the war ended. In return for this loan, the U.S.A. will be granted a relaxation in British import duties, and it s hoped to reduce
